#### Welsh

#### Glitter Jar

Sometimes when I feel a bit cross or a bit sad I like to make something to help me to relax. One thing I love to make is a glitter jar....

Can you create your own glitter jar?

Find a jar or plastic bottle and decorate it however you like - I like to use stickers or sometimes glitter glue!

Fill the bottle up 1/4 of the way with hot water.

Add 2 table spoons of Glycerine (optional – though it makes it a bit more-swirly) Then add 3 fluid ounces of clear glue

Add a few drops of food colouring and glitter (fine glitter works best) you will need about half a cup!

Mix...

Watch how the glitter moves around before it settles. Use this time as quiet time, think of things you are proud of, or what lovely things you are going to do tomorrow.

## Wormery Preparation - See below

Grown-up's to cut the top off the bottle....

Use a sharp pencil to pierce a hole near top of bottle to make cutting easier.

Equipment needed

2 litre clear, plastic bottle

Safety scissors

Compost or soil or a mixture of both

Sand

A few worms per bottle

Water sprayer to dampen layers

Worm food - grated carrot, vegetable peelings, dead leaves, shredded newspaper



## There's a worm at the bottom of the garden...

Earthworms are the world's unsung heroes. They loosen and mix up the soil, break down and recycle decaying plant matter and fertilise the soil by bringing nutrients closer to the surface. But, have you ever seen them at work under the ground? Create your own wormery and see them at work!

Collect some worms from the garden. Look in the compost heap, under stones in damp places or dig a hole,

- 1. Cut the top 1/4 off a 2 litre (or bigger) bottle, to make a lid.
- 2. Make a slit in the side of the lid so that the top can close over the bottom part.
- 3. Fill the bottle with alternating layers of sand, soil, sand, compost, sand etc.
- 4. Spray each layer with water so that it is damp.
- ${\bf 5}.$  Add a few worms to the top of the bottle and watch them burrow down.
- 6. Then add the 'food' to the top.
- 7. Wash hands well after handling worms and compost.
- 8. Wrap the black cardboard around the bottle to make it dark. Worms do not like light and it will encourage them to burrow around the outside of the bottle so they can be observed.
- 9. Place the wormery in a warm place. Remove the cardboard for observation periods and record findings. Check that the contents are damp and that there is food available for the worms.
- 10 After 1 week, release the worms back into the garden.
